Over the past couple of months work has been done to extend the building to improve the working environment and create additional space so that more people we support can gain work experience and people with more complex needs and physical disabilities can access work placements. We can't wait to welcome back our customers, staff and people we support, and are delighted that **Tim Henman OBE** will officially open the Tea Room on **Saturday 16th December at 10.30am**. #### **RESCUING THE TAWNY OWLS**

We have five resident species of owl that can be found living in our countryside: the Barn Owl, Little Owl, Short Eared Owl, Long Eared Owl and the Tawny Owl. Whilst Oxfordshire Wildlife Rescue have seen and cared for all these species, by far our most regular patients are the Tawny Owls. With their beautiful mottled brown feathers and their striking deep and dark eyes, they are captivating, no matter how many we see sadly come into care. The most common cases are, unfortunately, those that fall victim to our busy roads, usually while feeding on carrion left by earlier collisions. After them come the Tawny Owl orphans, which we start to see coming into the wildlife hospital around the



middle of April. Usually, these bundles of helpless 'fluff' are at an age where they can (with a little persuasive intervention) generally feed themselves. But this year, we had something a little special – two Tawny owlets spotted at the base of a damaged tree, no more than five days old and each so small that they could both easily fit in the palm of your hand. Upon arrival, both were dehydrated and in shock. After receiving fluids (electrolytes), both were snuggled up together in the parental warmth of one of our incubators. Their rearing proved to be tricky. Being so small (35g each) the frequency of the feeds was very time-consuming. Every three hours, both day and night, for the first two weeks, which is when volunteers who have insomnia suddenly become the charity's best friend!

By the time the owlets' eyes opened, we were caring for another nine or so other Tawny owlets who had a little more experience in their natural behaviour, which meant we could introduce our two little ones, who would quickly go on to develop and learn from the other youngsters. Come early autumn, it was time to release our Tawny Owls back into the wild. It's always a bittersweet moment, but we have done our bit, and the rest is up to them!

Nature is a beautiful thing, and one of the perks to this work is the ability to work closely with species such as the Tawny Owl. Right now, in December, you may hear their famous whistles and twit-woos echoing across our countryside during the dark winter nights. Sometimes I hear them here at the centre, and I do often wonder to myself, 'could that be one of our Tawny Owl youngsters from this year?' Perhaps, they are just letting us know they are doing well, back in their natural habitat, where they belong.




#### **BLEWBURY CHRISTMAS 2023 - EVENTS FROM THE BVS**

#### Christmas Eve – Santa's Sleigh and Carols on the Playclose

On Christmas Eve, Santa's mailbox will be open from 10:30 am to noon, at the Preschool (opposite the Church). 





#### **BLEWSHED NEWS**

**Community Projects:** We were delighted to welcome eight keen DIY beginners with varying degrees of experience to BlewShed's inaugural **'DIY for Beginners'** workshops on 24th October and 21st November. These workshops were on drilling and fixing, and attendees are now intending to put up their own shelves and curtain rails and start various woodworking projects. A repeat session will be held soon for those who couldn't come, along with a new workshop on saws and cutting; details and dates to be announced.

One of the sections of **Blewbury Cricket Club's mower** is now partly dismantled in BlewShed undergoing investigation, cleaning and diagnosis of what needs to be done. Much work, including replacement of broken parts and specialist regrinding of the three sets of blades will be required before you see the mower doing its work behind the tractor next summer. However, engineers Dick Street and Mike Magnay, currently at work on the project, believe the job can be done in time providing no major problems are encountered...

Every time our church clock chimes we can thank Dick for his considerable talents and effort! At our next meeting on Tuesday 12th December, 7.30pm we will have a drink and mince pies followed by a talk on 'long range shooting' by Simon Edwards. All are welcome.



#### **Lighting a Candle of Hope**

I wonder if you are a fan of the longer Winter nights? Many people find them quite a challenge. In the northern hemisphere, we shall soon be reaching the Winter Solstice- the 24 hour period with the fewest hours of daylight. The good news is that from then on, the hours of daylight gradually get longer and longer. It can be hard to believe this on a cold evening in January, but by the beginning of February I think most of us feel that the days really are lengthening, and that Spring can't be far behind.

The long Winter evenings remind us of the importance of light, and it is not surprising that festivals of light were held at this time of year. Light was particularly important in the days before artificial light was readily and cheaply available. Can you imagine what the Winter must have been like if you were dependent on a candle or two, occasionally supplemented by the light coming from a fire in the hearth?



I think every culture would understand the symbolism of a light shining in the darkness: it is a universal image, speaking of hope and security. The imagery of light is found throughout the Bible. A passage from an Old Testament prophet called Isaiah reads as follows: "Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen among you. For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will shine upon you, and his glory will appear over you. Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn." In the New Testament, the imagery of light is often applied to Jesus, who is called the Light of the World.

Whatever your religious beliefs, I think that there can be something really helpful and hopeful in the simple act of lighting a candle and remembering our loved ones. Churches often have candles available precisely for this purpose, and locally there are racks of such candles in Blewbury and Hagbourne churches. Do pop in and light a candle. As a Christian, I believe that a lighted candle points to the ever-present love of Jesus, the Light of the World. But whether you believe in God or not, a lighted candle can still speak powerfully of the importance of hope. There is always hope, and sometimes we need to remind ourselves of this, especially when the world around us seems a dark and unwelcoming place.

#### **JANKERS!**

[Editor's note: This is an extract from the autobiography of Blewbury resident Pat Warn, recounting an incident from his time in the Army Boys' Service. We encourage anyone with an interesting story to tell to submit it to the Bulletin for consideration; see the back page of this issue for our editorial guidelines.]

In February 1959 I committed my first serious misdemeanour, which meant I was on a charge. I was marched into office of the Officer Commanding C Company, Major Maitland, by the Company Sergeant-Major CSM 'Jock' Laing of the Scots Guards. He bellowed in my ear "Quick march! Left, right, left, right, left, right... halt! Left turn! Eyes front!" The clerk sitting next to the CO read out the charge. To summarise, I was late reporting back to camp from my 36-hour pass. Instead of being back by 23:59 I reported at 02:00 hours, that is two hours late.

The CO asked me if I had any thing to say in my defence. I said "No Sir" in a loud voice. The CO then said "I find you guilty as charged. Seven days' CB. March out." The Sgt-Major shouted "Left turn! Quick march! Left, right, left, right, left, right... halt! Right turn! Fall out and report to the Guardroom at 18:00 hours for the next seven days." I was so surprised that it was all over in a matter of minutes. Those fateful words shouted the Sgt-Major opened up a whole new world to me, who up to then in my career thought I had experienced everything that the Army could offer. How wrong was I? The punishment of seven days' CB meant I was confined to barracks for seven days and I had to report to the Guardroom at certain times of the day, and this punishment was colloquially known as 'Jankers'. It normally meant parading at the Guardroom as follows:

- 1st Parade: 6:30 am in denim fatigues for inspection and 15 minutes' drill on the Parade Ground.
- 2nd Parade: 1.00 pm in normal working dress and 15 minutes' drill on the Parade Ground.
- 3rd Parade: 6:00 pm in denim fatigues for inspection and two hours' fatigues.
- 4th and final Parade: 9.00 pm in best Dress Uniform for inspection.

The drill sessions were fast-moving and you were marched all over the parade ground at amazing speeds. Whenever you appeared to be getting too far away the drill NCO would shout "Mark time - get your knees up," and he would walk leisurely towards you until he had caught up with you. 'Fatigues' was the army word for doing all the dirty jobs around the camp, so when you were on Jankers all your leisure time was spent in the cookhouse washing pots and pans or around the camp picking up litter.

Our new Realbridge sessions online for December will be on Thursdays the 7th and 21st. Wantage will be hosting sessions on the 14th and 28th. Note also that there will be no F2F session in the Vale Room on Tuesday 28th November - we will be running an extra Realbridge session online that evening.

#### **NATURE NOTES**

As we transition into the winter and the leaves have long fallen off the trees strange shapes can appear in the hedges. A brisk walk along the concrete track or a jaunt to the Chalkpit, the keen-eyed observer will note strange, spherical, growths on Dog Roses. On closer inspection these flame red, alien, fibrous like structures consists of many small branches sprouting from the stem of the Rose. These are colloquially known as Robin's pincushions.

Robin's pincushions are scientifically known as the Rose Bedeguar Gall. Bedeguar is a French name, which itself is derived from the Persian word for 'brought by the wind'. The 'Robin' part of the common name derives not from the bird, but rather the nature sprite or fairy, of English folklore, 'Robin Goodfella'. Also known as 'Puck'. In Germany the gall is known as the 'sleep apple'. A gall placed under the pillow is said to aid slumber.

These growths, which do not harm the host plant, are caused by a tiny wasp *Diplolepis rosae*. The female of the species lays a series of up to 60 eggs in the spring on the developing leaf tips. In ways in which we do not fully understand, chemical signals from the feeding of the grubs stimulates the Rose into this extraordinary growth. This new plant growth is exceedingly nutritious for the developing larvae. As the gall develops the larvae continue to feed within the, now, woody chambers. When they are ready to pupate they overwinter within the gall, safe from predators. Ready to emerge again in the Spring, as the cycle continues. Only 1% of the emerging wasps will be male. The females are able to reproduce parthenogenetically, so no need for the pesky males!

Other wasp species also find shelter in the gall. These are known as 'inquilines'. Although these species did not cause the gall, they benefit from it. These species in turn are parasitised by other wasp species! And so, in no time at all, a thriving ecosystem has been formed, all interdependent on each other. Around seventeen species have been found living in the Rose Bedeguar Gall. It is also the symbol of the British Plant Gall Society. Those that study plant galls are known as cecidologists. *Glen Meadows* 

#### LETTER FROM DAVID JOHNSTON MP

Thank you very much to the 2,127 people who signed my petition to re-open Grove Station. It shows again the huge strength of feeling on this locally, and I will now be presenting it to the House of Commons and to the Department for Transport to make the case to them. Thanks too to Andy Holding of the Wantage and Grove Rail Supporters Group for his support. I will keep pushing for this station, which makes economic, social, and environmental sense.

We are the proud home of the 11 EOD and Search Regiment at Vauxhall Barracks in Didcot, and it was a pleasure to visit again and meet Lt Col Rob Swan and the team. Just this year they have so far responded to more than 1,800 requests in the UK to deal with explosive devices and I planted a remembrance stake in Parliament's Garden of Remembrance in their honour. I also, as ever, took part in poignant remembrance services and parades – this year in Wantage and Didcot. Thank you to everyone who made them happen.

UK Parliament Week takes place every November, and I was pleased to visit local schools and talk to different youth organisations about my role as an MP and how they can get involved in politics, including: Wallingford School, St Michael's CofE Primary School in Steventon, Brightwell Primary School, St Blaise Primary School, the 7th Abingdon Beavers, Chilton Explorer Scout Unit and Brightwell cum Sotwell Scouts.

I have been campaigning to improve our roads since I was elected and I have now launched my Local Roads Survey to enable you to say exactly where you are seeing issues that need to be resolved, including potholes, congestion, speeding and other safety concerns. I want to pull together a complete map of all the issues we are facing, and where, so that I can raise these with the road authorities. Now that I am the Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing, one of the things I have responsibility for is overseeing the Government's big new expansion in childcare. Once completed in Autumn 2025, it will give working parents 30 hours of free childcare every week from when their child is 9 months old until they start school. It is great be involved in delivering this exciting new policy and you can check eligibility at <a href="https://www.childcarechoices.gov.uk">www.childcarechoices.gov.uk</a>.

It is also great that the Prime Minister has successfully delivered on his promise to halve inflation by the end of the year. It involved hard decisions and discipline, but it is right that we focused on this as inflation eats away at the pound in your pocket and has had negative effects on both prices and interest rates.



#### FROM OUR CANADIAN CORRESPONDENT

Canada is the third largest country in the world, and its glaciers, steadily declining as a result of climate change, now cover about 2% of it. But if you exclude the Antarctic and Greenland ice sheets, Canada's landmass supports approximately 20% of the Earth's glacier ice volume, more than any other nation. Compare this with 18,000 years ago, when the whole continent and much of Europe of and Asia was covered in ice during the last ice age.

Its most accessible ice field is in the Rocky Mountains, astride the British Columbia – Alberta border, partially within the Jasper National Park. I visited part of it during a visit to Banff about 8 years ago and actually stood on the tip of the Athabasca Glacier, quite an experience. It is estimated that this will have completely disappeared between 2040 – 2100, and there is nothing we can do about it.

What happens when there is no more ice to melt and contribute to stream flows? There are six major rivers in BC, of which the Fraser is the largest (and Canada's fifth largest), its basin covering 240,000 sq km, roughly a quarter of the province! Our water in Vancouver comes from three pristine mountain reservoirs (Capilano, Seymour and Coquitlam) and is judged to be amongst the best water in the world. We also have a rainfall-rich climate, with rainfall in the reservoir areas estimated to be about 180 inches per year of new water. However, rainfall differs widely across the province, becoming much drier further inland. November and December are traditionally the wettest months (although sometimes June is known as January!) but we have had very little rain so far this month and the year is way down. The Government is doing all it can to persuade consumers to avoid wasting water, with strict watering regulations in place for most of the year and advice on how to avoid wasting water.

We in the privileged First World have the luxury of being able to turn on a tap to extract water; if we had to walk miles to the nearest standpipe (I remember the drought in 1976!) to get it, we would be a lot more careful with it!

#### **BLEWBURY CLIMATE ACTION**

The effects of Climate Change First it was called global warming, but it soon became obvious that this was an inaccurate name for describing all that was happening to our world. The amount of carbon dioxide in our atmosphere has risen from 280 to 420 parts per million since 1960. This human-induced rise is greater than the natural increase observed at the end of the last ice age 20,000 years ago, and the average global temperature has risen  $1.0~^{\circ}$ C in the same time period, but the temperature rise has also had a massive effect on the global oceans.



The sea covers more than 70% of Earth's surface, and water has a very high heat capacity (can store much more heat energy per cubic metre than the land). It has absorbed 90% of the warming that has occurred in recent decades due to increasing greenhouse gases, and the top few metres of the ocean store as much heat as Earth's entire atmosphere. The effects of ocean warming include sea level rise due to the warmer water expanding, coral bleaching, accelerated melting of Earth's major ice sheets, intensified hurricanes, and changes in ocean health and biochemistry. This data comes from NASA's Global Climate Change website, <a href="https://climate.nasa.gov">https://climate.nasa.gov</a> (Vital Signs of the Planet) and I thoroughly recommend this site. I get stuck on it for hours!

This article starts with a lot of science, but the main reason for the article is the marvellous images the NASA site includes: move to the right along the menu at the top of the page to EXPLORE, click on that, and then click on the top item in the new menu to the left of the page: IMAGES OF CHANGE. As you scroll through these images you will see just how varied the effects of climate change can be: extreme drought to extreme flooding.

And what has the UK experienced this year? The warmest October on record, long dry periods, torrential rainfall, strong winds. Welcome to our new world!
