BLEWBURY'S NIGERIAN LETTER BOX!



John Rogers, an authority on the history of the UK Post Office, spent a few months living in Blewbury last winter. During his time in the village he was able to furnish us with some fascinating details about our own village post office and its related postal services, some of which might surprise you.

Did you know for example that our village possesses a quite unusual 'Nigerian Letter Box'? This looks impressive and is to be found in Church End close to one of the former homes of our Post Office at Prior's Corner. What makes this a 'Nigerian Letter Box'? Well in the mid 1960s an order from Nigeria was placed with the Carron Company Iron Foundry, which is near Falkirk in Scotland, for a large number of brand new letter boxes. After this contract was fulfilled, there were still some left over and they were then used to meet requests from around the UK. How do we know that this one really is a genuine 'Nigerian Letter Box'? There are two distinguishing features. Firstly the maker's inscription on the back is 'Carron Scotland' rather than the usual 'Carron Company Stirlingshire', which was clearly thought not to be very meaningful for the Nigerian

public. Secondly, and some of you may not have noticed this, it is made all in one piece rather than the standard UK assembly which has two parts. Do have a look next time you are going past at another special part of our unique village! Other things that John told us about our Village Post Office were:

- It first opened on December 19th 1843
- It then came under Wallingford, but later came under Oxford before it came under Didcot from 1885
- It was closed from 1870-1872 before re-opening in Carramores on Church Road
- In the early years the village postmen/women would have been based in our village Post Office, and the outgoing mail would have been date stamped there as well.
- Money Orders and Savings Bank facilities were offered from 1893 and Telegrams began in 1870.

The object of The Tony Loy Trust is to support children and young people from Blewbury and the surrounding area in sports and the arts. We have provided **£57,000 in 112 grants** to individuals, organisations and projects. 44% of these have been in the arts: we have purchased keyboards, cornets and stage lighting in local schools; helped young companies stage productions at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival; sponsored people on music and drama courses; and helped a performing arts group send children to international festivals. 56% of our grants have been in sports: to elite sportspeople in athletics, triathlon and motorsport; to a girls' football and boys' rugby club; and to an all-weather goal area at a local recreation area and play equipment in a pre-school. Overall, our support has improved facilities, provided opportunities, strengthened communities and developed skills and confidence.

NEWS FROM BLEWBURY PRE-SCHOOL

We have had a lovely term thinking about 'Sounds Around' which includes letters and sounds of the week, together with a range of fun activities and experiences, both indoors and outside, as we explore phonics in the early years. The children have enjoyed planting home grown vegetables in our little garden and learning about the plant life cycle, finding out how our food grows, where it comes from and how the weather plays

a part in the natural world. We are preparing our older children for their transition to Primary School and we are delighted that the number of children at Pre-School is growing steadily so that we will have a healthy cohort to welcome back in September.

You may wonder why we need to keep fundraising so much. The level of the government funding early entitlement that we receive, known as free childcare for parents, is actually less than the cost of delivering a place for each child. This is due to the rising costs of energy and utilities, increased inflation on commodities and consumables, rise in the minimum wage, and other increased costs. Each year, in order to deliver sustainable quality care and education, we have to fundraise a substantial amount of money just to break even and some years we do run at a loss. We are always grateful to The Malthus Trust for their support in giving grants for specific pieces of equipment and new resources to help the children with their development. We would like to thank all our lovely village friends who support us in so many ways – from joining up to our Lottery Scheme, buying raffle tickets for our Grand Summer Raffle, to supporting our fund-raising stall at The Blewbury Beer Festival and this Spring, to The Blueberry and The Red Lion for donating some of their fund raising to us from the Charity Football match held recently. We are so grateful.

We are always looking for volunteers to help us manage Pre-School while the professional staff deliver the Early Years' Curriculum and if you have skills, particularly in finance or accounting, and would like put your previous experience to good use, we would love to hear from you.

NATURE NOTES: THE NORTHERN LIGHTS

Anyone up and around in the village or fortuitously peering through a northern window on the night of the 10th May, will not forget the sight that greeted them. Shimmering hues of purple and pink, infused with fluorescent green, columns of light stretching to the stars: a once in a generation, G5 highest magnitude,

geomagnetic storm had reached the southern shores of Blewbury!

The alien spectacle was indeed the Northen Lights, scientifically referred to as the Aurora Borealis. This term was first coined by Galileo in 1619. It derives from the roman goddess of the dawn, Aurora, who renewed herself every morning as she flew across the sky announcing the arrival of the sun. Borealis comes from the word for 'Northern Wind'. We still don't know all the mechanisms involved in the creation of auroras. However, the basic premise is that they are caused by the interaction of the solar wind and the Earth's magnetosphere. The intensity of the solar wind varies on an 11-year cycle. This, coupled with solar flares and mass coronal ejections, all contribute to a body of charged particles hurtling towards our planet at a mind-boggling speed of a million miles per hour. The solar maximum peaks in 2025, so there is plenty still to come for those that missed the historic events last month.

The different colours of the aurora relate to the chemical components of the atmosphere. Oxygen, at around 60 miles altitude, causes the greenish colour. Higher in the atmosphere at around 200 miles altitude, Nitrogen tends to produce the reddish, pinkish colours. Cameras can pick this light up with a longer exposure than the human eye. So, photos can look much brighter than what we can detect with our eyes alone.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH UPDATE

If you've read the article on page 5, you'll already be familiar with SID (Speed Indicator Device). When two of these devices were recently installed on London Road and Bessels Way, they were initially in spy mode, measuring the speeds of vehicles in both directions. This gave a baseline for measuring the

effectiveness of the devices and revealed some staggering speeds. After three weeks the signs were illuminated, producing a drop in speed with a couple of exceptions. Whilst there is little effect on the intentional speeder, the accidental speeder is alerted and reduces their speed as they approach the sign. As we all try to see that green 'Thank You', we also reduce the speed of the drivers behind us. Lower speeds result in fewer accidents and help to make our village a safer place for all.

However, the SIDs have not replaced Community Speedwatch. SIDs are about improving the safety of our main roads, and cannot identify individual offenders. Community Speedwatch targets individual drivers and can report them to the Police. The Community Speedwatch group is still active but we need more volunteers please. If you could give up one hour a month it would be a great help.

LETTER FROM SOUTH AFRICA

On every highway (and most byways), the lamp posts are festooned with what looks like cheerful bunting: in fact, the country is gearing up for a very significant election at the end of May and it feels like every political figure, alive or politically dead, is being dusted off and wheeled out in front of a camera to claw a share of the vote.

Loadshedding (planned powercuts due to insufficient electricity being generated) has abated for now, with many saying that it's a vote-garnering tactic by the ANC ahead of the elections. In reality, the ANC has capitulated on its promise to keep Eskom, the state power producer, as the electricity monopoly. President Cyril Ramaphose has now opened the floodgates to allow the private sector much more access to the energy market in South Africa and this, to an extent, is working, for now at least. The power crisis is widely believed to be the biggest issue in the coming election so it's vital for the ANC to literally keep the lights on as much as it can until election day. However the bigger issue is what the power crisis has done to the economy: the official unemployment rate is close to 40% but unofficially it's much higher and in some towns it's over 70%. In the simplest of terms, it's very hard to attract investment when you can't guarantee electricity supply. Growth has slowed to a pathetic 0.1% which is far below where it needs to be (around 6%) to pull the bottom 50% of the country out of grinding poverty.

So what can we expect out of the election? The official opposition to the ANC, the Democratic Alliance, a centre right party, controls the Western Cape and according to the affluent residents there governs well. The DA has for years tried to garner more of the black vote but with its 'business first' and 'top down' policies, it's been a tough road for them. They have around 20% of the national vote and have therefore formed an alliance with a broad church of smaller parties ahead of the election promising that should the ANC lose its sole mandate (and there is a distinct possibility that this could happen), they will go into coalition with them and their partners.

Following the recent ruling by the country's top court that former president Jacob Zuma cannot run for election, the wildcard in the mix is now the ebullient Julius Malema, the marmite of South Africa. Promising the moon (and the earth) to his supporters, Julius with his party the EFF, purports to be ultra left, promising rivers of money, opportunity and land to the mostly disaffected youth in the country. He's made considerable inroads into the national vote eyeing perhaps as much as the DA in this election. A former ANC cadre, he's consistently denied ever forming a coalition with the ANC but he could very well be the kingmaker the ANC needs this year. *Philip Rendel*

D-DAY'S UNSUNG HEROES – MORE TALES FROM THE MILITARY

Seeing that the celebrations for the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings are almost upon us, I thought instead of writing about my experience in the army, I would write about what happened on D-Day to the survey unit that I would join as a young surveyor sixteen years later. This unit is Y Survey Troop, part of 4 Survey Regiment Royal Artillery attached to 50th (Northumbrian) Division.

On D-Day the 6th of June 1944 began the largest seaborne invasion in history to bring about the liberation of German occupied north-west Europe from Nazi control. The invasion force was made up of two Army Groups, the British 21st Army Group under the command of General Bernard Montgomery and the American 1st Army Group commanded by Lieutenant-General Omar Bradley. The 50-mile invasion front west to east was divided into five landing beaches, Utah and Omaha where the American troops came ashore and Gold, Juno and Sword beaches where the British and Canadian troops landed. 50th (Northumberland) Division led the assault on Gold Beach under the command of Lieutenant-General Horrocks. The task given to 4 Survey Regiment was that on the first day of battle the regiment had to provide survey information to all the Royal Artillery regiments. The information required was to give the gunnery officers in each regiment the bearing and distance to the enemy targets.

Y Survey Troop, comprising twelve men commanded by Captain Hamer, came ashore at 08:20 hours alongside the troops of 50 Division. The survey party was made up of four pairs of observers and bookers, a sergeant compiler, two soldier computers and a dispatch rider on his motor-bike. The observers would use their theodolites to observe the sun to calculate a bearing and their assistant the booker would write down the angles in his book. This information would be collected by the dispatch rider from the observing pairs and taken to the sergeant compiler who would collate the results. He would then pass the results on to the two computers who would then calculate the information independently using mechanical calculators. This information showing the bearings and distance to various reference objects would be put on a bearing picket card and delivered by the dispatch driver to the gunnery officer commanding the guns. The gun crews would now know the distance and bearing to their targets. Sadly for the surveyors on landing, the visibility was virtually nil because of the grass fires and smoke caused by the initial bombing. Their first task was to establish survey points using a lighthouse, the only trigonometrical point available, a measured base line and a bearing from sun observations. This was not achieved until mid-day, some four hours after landing on Gold beach. Can you imagine a cartoon of a soldier surveyor with his tin helmet on, wading through the waves carrying a theodolite and tripod over his left shoulder and carrying a rifle with his right hand trying to dodge the bullets whizzing past? No. it was not like that. The surveyor would be pulling a handcart carrying all his instruments and personal gear along with his rifle.

Y Survey Troop as part of 4 Survey Regiment Royal Artillery would provide the survey information for all the artillery units of the British Army that fought from the Normandy beachhead through France, Holland and Germany and to ultimate victory in May 1945. The troop would remain stationed in West Germany as part of the British Army of the Rhine (BAOR) to protect West Germany against any surprise attack from Russia and their allies in East Europe. However, Y Troop was disbanded in 1975 due to the introduction of GPS that you are all familiar with in your cars. This was fourteen years before the collapse of communism and the end of the Cold War in 1989. *Pat Warn*

LETTER FROM DAVID JOHNSTON MP

I have had a number of meetings in the last month to progress various local campaigns that are a priority for me and my constituents. I met with the Health Minister to again push my campaign for better local health services and for our infrastructure to keep pace with all the new housing that is being built. This is a priority for the Government, too. For the year ending October 2023, there were 50.9 million more GP appointments compared to October 2019 - but there's more to do. Improving our health services is a key campaign for me and I am pleased the Minister has agreed to write to the local health leaders on our behalf.

I met with the Water Minister to again raise constituent concerns about the proposed reservoir and to call for public scrutiny of the proposal. In December, I wrote to the Environment Secretary about this, echoing GARD's call for public scrutiny and have been regularly raising concerns with Thames Water and the Environment Agency, who I took to Steventon recently where I discussed it with them. This meeting came just before we got the great news that Wallingford Beach has officially been designated as a bathing water site by the Government. This is something that residents have long called for and the Water Minister has rightly recognised the strong show of local support. I took Niamh Dernie, from Grove, to meet the Minister for Victims and Safeguarding so she could tell the Minister about her campaign against the sexual harassment she and her friends have experienced and what she would like to see happen. It was also great to welcome the Science Minister to meet with and take questions from our great local science and technology organisations at my latest Wantage and Didcot Science and Technology Forum. I was glad to hear the Minister confirm that the Government will spend £20 billion on investment in science and research this year which is welcome news for our local sector.

In other news, I had the pleasure of hosting a reception at Number 10 Downing Street for people working in our great early years sector and was pleased to bring Julie, a childminder from Didcot who spent 14 years fostering around 30 families, as my guest to recognise her incredible efforts. It was a really uplifting atmosphere as MPs from across the country brought people they wanted to thank for the work they have been doing to shape young minds as well as to help deliver this Government's record expansion of childcare.

Didcot TRAIN works with young people, especially those who are disadvantaged or vulnerable and provides various essential services including youth clubs, mentoring and outreach programmes. They are doing great work to empower young people. Thank you to Ben and the team at Didcot TRAIN who I visited recently to see the work they are doing. FROM OUR CANADIAN CORRESPONDENT - BC BIRDS

On the face of it, we seem to have a lot of birds that are similar to the UK, such as the wren and sparrow, and the large crow family (the Corvids) but often they are different species. The local sparrow is the **Dark Eyed Junco** that has a distinctive dark head and white tail feathers and is the most abundant sparrow in the province. The **Bewick Wren** looks just look the European wren, being tiny and with the familiar very loud song, but it is just one of many different species that live here. The **American Robin** is in fact a member of the thrush family but gets its name because of its reddish brown breast plumage. More unusual is the **Northern Flicker**, a member of the woodpecker family, this one having the very annoying habit of drilling its beak onto metal posts or chimneys as a way to attract to mates and mark its territory. Another striking (haha) bird is the **Stellar's Jay** that is the provincial bird of BC; it has similar vivid blue plumage to the English Jay but has a distinctive dark head crest.

The most popular of all BC birds (in a recent poll) is **Anna's Hummingbird**, native to the province. The males are brilliantly coloured in emerald and rose with a stocky shape and straight bill, and well accustomed to living in urban areas. Many residents have hummingbird feeders so they can watch these fascinating tiny birds up close. Also popular, the **Black-capped Chickadee** has a distinctive call (similar to wee-woo) and is reminiscent of the tit family. Bird sounds are used at pedestrian crossings to aid the visually impaired: currently North/South – chirp chirp, East/West - cuckoo. The largest and most famous local birds are the **Canada Geese** and **Bald Headed Eagles**. The goose, with its distinctive long black neck, is a familiar site in parks and open spaces where it deposits large amounts of droppings, and makes a loud honking sound; it is native to North America, but can be found in all parts of Europe, Scandinavia and even as far afield as the Falkland Islands! The Eagle is a sea eagle (bird of prey), native to North America, with a distinctive white head; it is so called because of an old English word "balde" meaning white. They are commonly seen along the Pacific coast, and we have a large population that live near the highway to the coastal ferries. The Eagle has been the national emblem of the United States since 1782, and a spiritual symbol for indigenous people for far longer than that.

And let's not forget the **Loon**, a species of waterfowl that has the distinction of appearing on our \$1 coin, known locally as a Loony (and the \$2 is called a Toony!). It is an expert swimmer because of its legs set far back on its body, but very awkward on land. **Angela Hoy** (angelahoy23@gmail.com)



D-DAY POSTSCRIPT (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 17)

At a Y Troop Reunion in 1997 I met a gentleman from Newcastle who was our guest of honour. He was a mining surveyor aged 23 when he joined Y troop on the outbreak of war in 1939. He served with Y Troop in the Western Desert and Sicily Campaigns before the troop returned to England in January 1944 to prepare and train for the invasion of France. He told me he was one of the observers who came ashore on June 6 1944 and he was grateful that he returned home unharmed after six years of war in July 1945.

For the record there were eleven Royal Artillery Survey Regiments in World War 2 and they operated in all theatres of war. Seventy surveyors were killed in action and twenty-five members of X Survey troop were drowned. This happened after the men were captured at Tobruk in May 1942. In November 1942 814 allied prisoners of war embarked on to the Italian ship SS Scillin to be taken to POW camps in Italy. However the ship was intercepted by a British submarine HMS Sahib. When the ship failed to stop when ordered, the submarine fired two shells at the cargo ship and then launched a single torpedo which hit the ship in the centre and it rapidly sank. Prisoners below deck had little chance of surviving. Over a thousand people were aboard the ship but the submarine could only rescue sixty-two: the ship's captain, thirty-four Italian crew and twenty-seven POWs. When the crew of the submarine heard the survivors speaking English, they then realised the terrible mistake they had made.

At the time the Royal Navy submarine commanders had been ordered told not to attack enemy civilian ships *enroute* from North Africa to Italy. At the Court of Enquiry the submarine captain was cleared of culpability, since he claimed that the ship had borne no lights and he believed the ship was carrying Italian troops and had not responded to the initial shelling (two rounds).

The new speed indicator devices (SIDs) on London Road and Bessels Way are collecting data. Early evidence is that 'accidental' speeders are reducing their speeds. However, some vehicles are still being driven through the village at very high speeds (and not just at night). Disappointingly, OCC has removed the proposed A417 pedestrian crossing near Savages from its workstream without any consultation with the PC, which officially requested it. We will lobby to change this, but we're frustrated that our councillor, Sally Povolotsky, has not been to a PC meeting for nearly a year. We hope she will be at the June meeting – if anyone feels strongly about a crossing to make the London Road safer for pedestrians, please email her to let her know, or come to the meeting to say so in person. Discussions are at an early stage about the replacement of both the skate ramp and small cycle track at TFF.

Responses to the District Council:

P24/V1018/FUL & P24/V1005/LB Ashbrook Mews, Westbrook Street Application for inset PV roof panels. No objection. P24/V0956/FUL & P24/V0958/LB Abners Barn, Church Road Proposed renovation, conversion and extension of grade II listed barn, pursuant to planning consents P21/V0405/FUL & P21/V0406/LB (July 2021). BPC has no objection to the proposed rear extension. We object to the numerous small, square windows on the large roof facing Church Road, and the 'French doors' in place of the original barn entrance. In line with P7 of the NDP, all alterations to historic buildings (such as this) should be sensitive to their context in terms of design, scale and mass. In this highly visible location in the conservation area, longer rooflights (i.e. with a vertical emphasis) are preferred, and less subdivided expanse of glass would better reflect the scale of the original barn doors.

P24/V0945/LB Corrydon House, London Road Various alteration works to cross wing of listed building: Creation of ensuite and associated plumbing, restoration of mullion window, remove modern gallery mezzanine and ladder stairs, remove modern kitchen wall to enable structural intervention, restore timber frame posts, lay new limecrete floor with underfloor heating, install new French doors and wood burning stove. BPC has no objection.

P23/V2635/FUL Land at the end of Coffin Way Construction of a single dwelling and associated external works. Appeal registered 24.4.24. BPC has no further comment.

Decisions from the District Council:

Correction: P24/V0249/PIP Workshop adjacent to Upperton, Pilgrim's Way. Permission in principle has been granted for conversion of existing buildings for residential development (as amended by description agreed 21 March 2024). Last month it was incorrectly reported that permission had been granted for residential development on the site.

P24/V0533/HH Lowmans, South Street Rear extension, internal alterations, new rooflights, external wall materials changed. Granted.

P24/V0405/FUL Open space in village centre called the Playclose Community artwork sculpture made of stainless steel and corten steel, with a corten steel base. Granted.

P23/V1169/FUL Blewbury Service Station, London Road Retrospective application for a 3m rear extension. Granted. The applicant has been informed that the extension built means that they cannot implement the extant permission for new houses at Ridgeway (P21/V1626/FUL) as per the approved plans. A fresh application or an amendment to the permission will be needed to enable the development, including (potentially) changes to the layout.
